Functions	<p>The primary function of the Affected Persons Committee is to give advice and make recommendations to the Minister for Education and Industrial Relations about the information and support needs of persons affected by work-related fatalities and serious incidents.</p> <p>The committee was established in an interim capacity in November 2015 after it was identified by affected families, including the Chair and members of the current committee, that there was a need to establish a group of people with lived-experience to provide a voice on behalf of those who have died or been seriously injured in work-related incidents.</p> <p>On 23 August 2017 the Affected Persons Committee was established in legislation by amendments to the <i>Work Health and Safety Act 2011</i>. All but one member was appointed to the Affected Persons Committee by the Minister for Education and Industrial Relations on the 18 December 2018 for three-year terms. A further appointment was made to the Affected Persons Committee on 25 March 2020 for a three-year term.</p> <p>The Affected Persons Committee meets quarterly, and members provide their time on a voluntary basis.</p>
Achievements	<p>The committee welcomed a new member, Ms Samantha Wood on 25 March 2020. The Affected Persons Committee had four meetings during the reporting period one of which was chaired via Microsoft Teams as an online meeting platform due to COVID-19 restrictions.</p> <p>Achievements include:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • The committee continued to provide advice and information on the support needs of bereaved families by strengthening linkages and partnerships with Government and non-government agencies; • Collaborated with Billiton Mitsubishi Alliance to develop a Standard Fatality Response for employers following the death of a man at Saraji mine in December 2018; • Established linkages with the Australian Sugar Milling Council to advise on the support needs of bereaved families in the sugar industry; • Consulted with the West Australian WorkSafe Commissioner about the development of an affected persons committee in Western Australia; • Offered continued support and guidance to the Family Reference Group (FRG) for Worksafe Victoria and hosted FRG members at the March 2020 meeting; • Participated in the Safe Work Australia (SWA) scoping study of the jurisdictional arrangements for providing support to families affected by an industrial death; • Participated in vicarious trauma training as part of a newly developed wellness strategy to support committee members in performing their roles; • Four members completed Safety Advocate training with the Office of Industrial Relations (OIR) and are regularly booked for Safety Advocate talks and presentations throughout Queensland with a special interest in promoting electrical safety in Far North Queensland; and • The APC continues to inform the family support service within the OIR coronial investigation liaison unit. <p>The Principal Advisor is a dedicated role that supports the Affected Persons Committee, primarily providing secretariat services and enabling the empathic values aligned to the committee's work. The position also takes carriage of initiatives undertaken by the Committee. During the year this position became</p>

Functions	<p>Legislation was passed in 1965 that allowed places of public entertainment and amusement to trade on the afternoon and evening of ANZAC Day. This signalled the end of an era in which ANZAC Day was a 'closed day' and business trading was very restricted. The Parliament of the day was optimistic that in return for the bonus of extra trading hours on ANZAC Day, those businesses which benefited would donate to the ANZAC Day Trust Fund. The fund was established under the same legislation and provides funding, on application, to organisations offering financial assistance and relief to ex-service men and women and their dependents.</p> <p>The annual disbursement of the trust fund to over 200 ex-service organisations supports:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • aged and infirm veterans wishing to remain in their own homes; • maintenance of essential services; • the construction and maintenance of homes/units for war veterans; and • many other services such as advocacy, hospital visits, food hampers and gift/amenities parcels for the sick. <p>An annual appeal for donations each April begins with a mail out targeting those businesses providing public entertainment and amusement. However, the main source of funds continues to be an annual grant provided by the Queensland Government.</p>				
Achievements	In 2019–20, payments totalling \$1,577,849.00 were disbursed to 216 applicant ex-service organisations. In 2018-19, 199 organisations benefitted. Preliminary indications are that disbursements will be given to more than 200 organisations in 2020–21.
